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

The sharp eyed amongst you will notice that the Arts and Crafts Movement in Surrey graphic above has changed colour from the last e-newsletter. The artwork has now been refined, with enhanced outlines, to ensure better definition for digital use. The green Pantone colourway has been selected to match that originally selected by the Society. This month's article is kindly submitted by Peter Andrews and is entitled *Darmstadt – Triumph and Tragedy*. I am attaching the whole article in pdf format.

Nativity Window. John Hardman & Co. 1884-1889.

This December's Christmas Nativity window is from the apse of Holy Trinity, Llandudno in North Wales. It is one of five double lancets which commemorate the Thursby family. The script below the scene reads 'She brought forth her first-born son and wrapped him in swaddling clothes.' The dedication is 'To the glory of God and Major James Legh Thursby.' He lived from 1828 to 1886 when he died in Harrogate and was buried in Brighton! *The Peerage* states that he was a J.P. and lived at Craig-le which I think is Craig-y-don, a suburb of Llandudno. Therein must lie a tale.

The church was built in 1874 for the 'huge influx of holiday makers who came to the expanding seaside resort from the nearby industrial cities of Liverpool and Manchester' from 1860 onwards. The church is in the thirteenth century Gothic style and was designed by George Felton. He had been appointed surveyor and architect in 1857 for the Mostyn family who laid out the town in 1849 and leased most of the plots for development. For twenty years, Felton supervised the development of central Llandudno. In 1882, the church tower was built and eight bells installed a year later. On the choir vestry door and the screen are two

tiny mice carved by Robert Thompson. The Hardmans were close collaborators with A.W.N. Pugin. They will feature in a forthcoming ACMS lecture in March next year.

The Victorian Society announced the sudden death of Dr Geoff Brandwood on 1st December. 'His work ranged from historic pubs to late Victorian churches. He was the leading expert on Temple Moore and was working on a monograph on G.E. Street at the time of his death... He will be much missed, not only for his impressive list of achievements but for his friendly and approachable manner.'

In 2013, he gave a lecture to ACMS on 'A Practice like no other: Sharpe, Paley and Austin of Lancaster'. In the same year he also led a visit to four of London's Victorian Pubs. I frequently refer to his book *Britain's Best Real Heritage Pubs*.

Surrey Local Heritage Asset Project

A number of our members made nominations for this project including Sarah Sullivan on behalf of ACMS. I hope to report in future on those that are adopted.

'As part of this project, we have been asking people to nominate buildings, features, places and designed landscapes they feel make a significant contribution to their local environment through their heritage interest. This took place over October and November 2021, and the response has been overwhelming. Over 900 heritage assets have now been nominated by residents and local groups across the six participating boroughs and districts.

Nominations have now closed, and we are moving to the next stage of the project. Each nominated asset will be assessed against the **selection criteria**, to decide whether they qualify for inclusion on the local list. As well as the nominated assets, we will also be reviewing those assets already on district and borough local lists. This work will take a number of months. We are aiming to produce draft lists in the Spring/Early Summer of 2022, after which they will be consulted on. On completion of this work, it is anticipated that each local list will be adopted by its respective Council to inform and guide future planning decisions.' https://www.surreycc.gov.uk/land-planning-and-development/historical-planning/listproject



Brimptsmead, Dartmoor

Properties advertised in *Country Life* frequently have the tag 'Arts and Crafts' attached to them with no further details about the architect or history of the building. Very frustrating. One such is the Brimptsmead Estate started in 1893 when permission was granted to build a hunting lodge and summer home. The building was completed in 1906 and leased from the then Prince of Wales. The turreted property is built from pink granite. The agents are keen to point out that it has 26,000 clay tiles and 120 lead light mullioned windows!
